Seasonal Shift for the Philokalia Group: As many of you may know, a small group of us have been meeting weekly for several months slowly working our way through the first volume of the of the early church’s collected spiritual writings known as the Philokalia--in Greek, the ‘Love of the Beautiful’.

As our liturgical year progresses toward Advent and the holy seasons to follow, we thought it would be most supportive to interested parishioners if we postponed our progressive study of the Philokalia in order to focus our time on some contemporary writings that more accurately reflect the seasons with which we will be Liturgically engaged.

Consequently, our first selection will be Fr. Thomas Hopko’s *The Winter Pascha: Readings for the Christmas-Epiphany Season*, which is available in the parish book and gift store. Once we have entered the New Year we may continue with Fr. Hopko’s *The Lenten Spring: Readings for Great Lent* or Fr. Alexander Schemann’s *Great Lent: Journey to Pascha*.

Synaxis of St Michael and All Angels

November 8 is the feast of Saint Michael and all the angels. In the *Book of Tobit*, Saint Raphael announced: "I am Raphael, one of the seven angels who stand in the glorious presence of the Lord, ready to serve him." (Tobit 12:15). Pope Gregory I listed the **seven archangels as: Michael, Gabriel, Raphael, Uriel (or Anael), Simiel, Oriphiel, and Raguel. The feast itself is ancient, being set up by the Council of Laodicea in 363-64 AD.** The day was established in November, the ninth month after March (with which the year began in ancient times) since there are **Nine Ranks of Angels**.

The **eighth day of the month** was chosen for the *Synaxis of all the Bodiless Powers of Heaven* since the **Day of the Dread Last Judgment is called the Eighth Day** by the holy Fathers. After the end of this age (characterized by its seven days of Creation) will come the Eighth Day, and then **“the Son of Man shall come in His Glory and all the holy Angels with Him” (Mt. 25:31)**.

The **nine choirs of angels** were listed by Pseudo-Dionysius, an important spiritual writer from the late 300s as Seraphim, Cherubim, Thrones, Dominions, Virtues, Powers, Principalities, Archangels and Angels. The **Seraphim** attend God's throne in the heavenly Liturgy (Isaiah 6:1-8). While western art has reduced the awesome **Cherubim** to chubby little babies, in Scripture they are far more impressive: six-winged, and four faces: that of a lion (representative of all wild animals), an ox (domestic animals), a human (humanity), and an eagle (birds), from where we get the symbols of the Four Evangelists of the Gospels. **Thrones** carry God's Throne in heaven, and serve the wishes of Our Lord Jesus Christ. **Dominions** are shown as having two wings but carrying orbs or scepters. They organize the guardian angels. **Virtues** are the angels through whom God's signs and miracles are made in creation. **Powers** fight demons and are shown with shields and swords. **Principalities** are shown wearing crowns and carrying scepters. They organize bands of angels, fulfill the orders of higher ranking angels or God Himself. **Archangels** serve as messengers of God, guard countries, and often help with Christian armies fighting evil forces. **Angels** serve as messengers to individuals, and from their ranks come the personal **guardian angels** assigned to protect the billions of human beings.

Saint Michael is invoked for protection of police, armed forces, grocers, and against the devil. In the ancient Church he was also the one who helped pass judgment on souls after death, and he is still invoked for healing. **Saint Raphael** is known especially for healing and conquering evil, from his adventures in the Book of Tobit with Tobias. He is also the helper of people who emigrate from their homelands, doctors, counselors, social workers, and against nightmares. **Saint Gabriel** is, naturally, the patron saint of communications, stamp collectors, postal workers, and diplomats. **The Blessed Virgin Mary, the Theotokos, is the Queen of Angels, which is the actual title of the city of Los Angeles.**

November 12th - Saint Josaphat, Bishop and Martyr

Saint Josaphat was a great promoter of the union of the Catholic and Orthodox Churches, through the Greek Catholic (Byzantine Catholic) Church established in 1596 in Poland-Lithuania. Unfortunately, the Orthodox minority had rallied after years of persecution and now there was enmity between the two Churches. Josaphat was a famous preacher and missionary: the Orthodox called him the "thief of souls" because he was so successful at promoting Union with Rome. He was appointed archbishop of Polotsk, but when he arrived, he found a mess: churches were in disrepair, some priests had married after ordination in violation of the canons, and the monasteries were in decay. He successfully set about to fix this. However, he was often opposed by the Orthodox bishop and monks and many of the Latin Catholics would not help him.

In Vitebsk, a mob was stirred up by the local archbishop, but Josaphat refused to respond to the violence and kept himself calm and forbade the Greek Catholics with him to resort to violence. He was brutally murdered, defended only by the Jews and his dog (which was also killed with him) on November 12, 1623. The Orthodox archbishop and people eventually repented, and became Greek Catholics. Josaphat's body has remained incorrupt ever since, despite the terrible wounds he suffered. He was canonized in 1867, and his body rests in Saint Peter's Basilica.
