His specialties are marriage and family, Eastern Church Fathers, Theology of Deification, Spirituality of the Desert Fathers, and spiritual direction, among other areas.

**#1 Lesson in Evangelization - Prayer**

How can you put into practice the New  
Evangelization? How can you fulfill your most  
important calling as a Byzantine Catholic - to be a  
witness to the Risen Christ?

For the next few months, the Eparchial Office of  
Evangelization and Religious Education will assist  
you in finding answers to these questions. Since you  
must possess the love of Christ before you can  
share it, these Lessons in Evangelization are  
designed to help you renew your Catholic faith, and  
then go out to all and share the Good News. This  
first lesson focuses on the most important behavior  
of the authentic Christian.

**PRAYER**

Prayer is communicating personally with your all-  
powerful Creator. Such communication is impossible  
in other religions because they view the Divine as  
Beyond, Implacable, or Disinterested, and  
Impersonal. Yet, Christianity is utterly different from  
all other religions - and that is the Good News that  
you, as a Christian, are called to share with others.

In Christ, God did not keep Himself at a distance, but  
made Himself known, accessible to you personally  
by being born into a family, growing up, playing,  
working, and dying, and ultimately resurrecting – and  
then founding a Church wherein the people of all  
times and places can be baptized, forgiven, healed,  
nurtured and instructed, and finally welcomed into  
the heavenly kingdom.

But you derive no benefit from this extraordinary love  
of the Creator unless you open your heart to Him in

The Byzantine Catholic Church contains a treasure trove of  
resplendent prayers: from the Eucharistic celebration of the  
Divine Liturgy, to Matins (morning prayers), Vespers  
(evening prayers), Akathists, Molebens, and the Jesus  
Prayer and the hours of the Divine Praises. It also has the  
Bible, the teachings of the church, the fathers and the  
saints.

With this wealth at your disposal, there is no excuse for  
having a poor prayer life – that is, there is no excuse for  
failing to communicate personally and directly with your  
Creator.

But there are plenty of excuses. Job, driving the kids, yard  
work, social media, texting, ill health, catching up on the  
news. Like Martha in Luke’s Gospel, people are “worried  
and anxious about many things.”

Martha was “burdened with much serving” when she asked  
Jesus to admonish her sister to help her with the household  
tasks. Yet the Lord did not respond by releasing Mary from  
her prayer. Just the opposite, He said, “Only one thing is  
necessary. Mary has chosen the better part and she will not  
be deprived of it.” (Luke 10:40-42)

Jesus was exceedingly busy. He left his work as a carpenter  
in Nazareth to travel throughout Judea and Samaria,  
preaching and healing. He had “nowhere to lay His head,”  
(Matthew 8:20) and was inundated by the crowds. Yet, He  
frequently separated Himself from His companions and went  
to lonely places to pray.

Through His words and actions, Jesus taught that prayer is  
essential. Prayer is at the heart of the New Evangelization; it  
is the first and most important task of the Christian.

Until the next Lesson, I encourage you to make prayer a  
priority. If private prayer is not incorporated as a daily habit  
in your life, resolve to begin at once. A good practice is to  
start small the first week, with 10 minutes a day. It takes  
about two months to establish a habit. Add five or ten more  
minutes each week until you commune with your Redeemer  
for at least one half hour per day.

Let liturgical and private prayer permeate your life. From this  
fountain, you will go forth refreshed, and able to give a cup  
of Living Water to the thirsty who will otherwise perish in the  
parched land of godlessness.

## St. Martin, Bishop of Tours, Feast day, October 12

St. Martin is still a popular saint in East and West. Born in what is now Hungary to a military family, he became a catechumen at the early age of 10 in 326. It was not a popular choice: Christians were still a minority in the western empire.

As part of his military life, he became a cavalryman, hence the images of him on his faithful horse. He was serving in a cavalry unit near Amiens, in modern France, where the most commonly-known incident of his life took place. At the gates of the city of Amiens he met a scantily clad beggar. He impulsively cut his own military cloak in half and shared it with the beggar. That night, Martin dreamed of Jesus wearing the half-cloak he had given away. He heard Jesus say to the angels: "Here is Martin, the Roman soldier who is not baptized; he has warmed me." With that, he decided for baptism at the age of 18.

In 336, he was released from the service and became a disciple of St. Hilary of Poitiers, where he adhered to orthodox Christian teaching, not the Arian heresy favored by so many leaders and the invading barbarians. For a third time, he did not take the popular course. He eventually became an evangelizer, and stories of his deeds have survived in western France to our time! He always returned to his beloved monastery and hermitage, but in 371 he agreed to become the bishop of Tours. He worked fervently against heresy, but always with compassion. He became one of France's most loved saints.

## St. John XXIII

October 11 - Today the Church honors Saint John XXIII, baptized as Angelo Roncalli, Pope of Rome 1958-1963, canonized in 2007. Many forget that he had a deep love for the Eastern Churches, both Catholic and Orthodox.



**Bl. Roman Lysko**

Fr. Roman Lysko was ordained in 1941 during the German occupation of western Ukraine. He and his wife remained Greek Catholic after the bishops were arrested in 1945 and after the Soviets declared that the Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church no longer existed.

In 1949, Father Lysko was arrested, and he and his wife were "guilty" of the crime of working with teenagers and young adults after the Soviets forbade such apostolates, and were convicted of "cultivating in them the Catholic Faith, and thus an anti-Soviet spirit." After May 1950 there was no word of him. In 1956 the Soviets rehabilitated him after the Khrushchev "thaw" and said this healthy young man supposedly died of heart trouble.

After 1991, it was discovered that on October 14, 1949, Father Roman Lysko was killed after over a month of brutal torture at the hands of the Soviet NKVD in the main prison of L'viv, Ukraine. Having failed to break the spirit of this young priest, who knew the 150 Psalms by heart, he was walled up alive, and left to die there. He chanted the psalms, until his voice finally fell silent for all time. He was beatified in 2001 by Pope John Paul II.
