We will be welcoming **Father Yosyp Veresh** of the Eparchy of Mukachevo to our church for a five-week visit beginning Nov. 4. Father will be giving a Parish Mission to prepare us for the Filipovka/ Fast of Saint Philip, the 40 days before Christmas, to which the public will be invited.

Father Yosyp is a longtime friend of Fr. Artur. Fr. Yosyp holds doctoral degrees from Austria and Poland, and has served at the International Theological Institute in Austria, licentiate and master's from Austria, and his seminary degree from Ukraine. His specialties are marriage and family, Eastern Church Fathers, Theology of Deification, Spirituality of the Desert Fathers, and spiritual direction, among other areas.

#1 Lesson in Evangelization - Prayer

How can you put into practice the New Evangelization?
How can you fulfill your most important calling as a
Byzantine Catholic - to be a witness to the Risen Christ?

For the next few months, the Eparchial Office of
Evangelization and Religious Education will assist you in
finding answers to these questions. Since you must
possess the love of Christ before you can share it, these
Lessons in Evangelization are designed to help you
renew your Catholic faith, and then go out to all and share
the Good News. This first lesson focuses on the most
important behavior of the authentic Christian.

PRAYER

Prayer is communicating personally with your all-powerful
Creator. Such communication is impossible in other
religions because they view the Divine as Beyond,
Implacable, or Disinterested, and Impersonal. Yet,
Christianity is utterly different from all other religions - and
that is the Good News that you, as a Christian, are called
to share with others.

In Christ, God did not keep Himself at a distance, but
made Himself known, accessible to you personally by
being born into a family, growing up, playing, working,
and dying, and ultimately resurrecting – and then
founding a Church wherein the people of all times and
places can be baptized, forgiven, healed, nurtured and
instructed, and finally welcomed into the heavenly
kingdom.

But you derive no benefit from this extraordinary love of
the Creator unless you open your heart to Him in prayer -
daily. God invites, but He does not force.

The Byzantine Catholic Church contains a treasure trove of
resplendent prayers: from the Eucharistic celebration of the
Divine Liturgy, to Matins (morning prayers), Vespers
(evening prayers), Akathists, Molebens, and the Jesus
Prayer and the hours of the Divine Praises. It also has the
Bible, the teachings of the church, the fathers and the
saints.

With this wealth at your disposal, there is no excuse for
having a poor prayer life – that is, there is no excuse for
failing to communicate personally and directly with your
Creator.

But there are plenty of excuses. Job, driving the kids, yard
work, social media, texting, ill health, catching up on the
news. Like Martha in Luke's Gospel, people are "worried
and anxious about many things."

Martha was "burdened with much serving" when she asked
Jesus to admonish her sister to help her with the household
tasks. Yet the Lord did not respond by releasing Mary from
her prayer. Just the opposite, He said, "Only one thing is
necessary. Mary has chosen the better part and she will not
be deprived of it." (Luke 10:40-42)

Jesus was exceedingly busy. He left his work as a carpenter
in Nazareth to travel throughout Judea and Samaria,
preaching and healing. He had "nowhere to lay His head,"
(Matthew 8:20) and was inundated by the crowds. Yet, He
frequently separated Himself from His companions and went
to lonely places to pray.

Through His words and actions, Jesus taught that prayer is
essential. Prayer is at the heart of the New Evangelization; it
is the first and most important task of the Christian.

Until the next Lesson, I encourage you to make prayer a
priority. If private prayer is not incorporated as a daily habit
in your life, resolve to begin at once. A good practice is to
start small the first week, with 10 minutes a day. It takes
about two months to establish a habit. Add five or ten more
minutes each week until you commune with your Redeemer
for at least one half hour per day.

Let liturgical and private prayer permeate your life. From this
fountain, you will go forth refreshed, and able to give a cup
of Living Water to the thirsty who will otherwise perish in the
parched land of godlessness.

Saints this Week

Saint John Paul II October 22

Where does one begin with this saint? At his death, one million people from around the world packed Rome's streets chanting "santo subito!" or "Canonize Now". While managing the implementation of Vatican II reforms in Poland, he kept traditional practices that helped keep the Church stable. He was a forced laborer under the Nazis, engaged in underground theater to keep Polish culture alive in its own country where Nazi ideology sought to destroy it.

A secret seminarian, he was ordained when Poland had become Communist thanks to being abandoned by the Western powers. When he emerged as Pope, he encouraged people "Be not afraid" and helped with the overthrow of communism in Poland and eastern Europe by preaching respect for people as being made in the image and likeness of God and being valuable not for their economic output but as children of God.

He was a prolific traveler who electrified the crowds who came to see him. An active swimmer and skier, he endured prolonged suffering from Parkinson's disease. He gave witness to the value of Christian dying at the same time that in the USA Terri Schiavo was legally murdered by being denied nutrition so that her husband could remarry. A son of Poland, his close friend in the Vatican was a German from an anti-Nazi family, Cardinal Josef Ratzinger, who succeeded him.

A great theologian and teacher, his Theology of the Body continues to positively affect marriage preparation programs and redeems human sexuality from the corruption of modern sensualism and pornography. He was an amazing pontiff, who wanted above all else to pray.

State Fair Report
