

Mysteries of Baptism/Chrismation/ Eucharist:

Must be arranged three months in advance. (Pre-Jordan requirement)

Mystery of Crowning:

Must be arranged six months in advance (Pre-Cana requirement)

Sick and Shut-Ins: It is the family's responsibility to notify the parish office when a parishioner is in the hospital or confined to home because of sickness or old age. Father will bring the confined person the Holy Mysteries on a regular basis. It is recommended that one receive the Anointing of the Sick before any major surgery. MANDATORY SAFE ENVIRONMENT ONLINE TRAINING FOR ALL THE VOLUNTEERS

Reminder: PLEASE, CHECK your Safe Environment Compliance Certificate Expiration date. Please note that Online Virtus training for many will be expiring within August-Sept-October. The Eparchy's revised Safe Environment Policy no longer allows for lapses in compliance either in Virtus training or in background screenings - for ALL OLPH VOLUNTEERS AND EXPLORER YOUTH GROUP LEADERS. Anyone falling out of compliance at any point must immediately cease from their designated area of service at OLPH until such time as they are in compliance once again. No one - not members of the clergy, volunteers, educators, employees etc. - may serve for even one day when out of SEP compliance. Thank you for your vigilance in this matter.

Meditation by Fr. Chris

Today the Church continues the baptismal theme and the use of water, but here spiritual blindness is removed as well as physical. In fact, icons of the miracle show the pool of Siloam in the shape of a baptismal font. It is important to note that the man "was born blind" as this emphasizes the power of the miracle. This is not removal of cataracts but the giving of sight for the first time, to someone born without vision.

The Byzantine Catholic Church also continues the Pentecostal theme, because the later history of Jewish Christians being expelled from synagogues is put into this story from Jesus' lifetime. The Holy Spirit strengthens us in persecution: this newly cured man loses everything because he defends both Jesus and the miraculous cure. His parents are afraid to back him up, he can't go into the synagogue, and his very identity is challenged! When he hears the voice of Jesus, he worships Him, recognizing that this is the Man who not only gave him physical sight, but also that He must be divine. He had been sent to Siloam, and now he has a double gift, of seeing physically and spiritually, and being sent onto a new journey of life.

Ascension Thursday comes at the end of the forty days of Pascha. On Wednesday morning, the Easter canon is sung for the last time, and then the Plaschanitsa is removed from the altar and can be laid in the tomb for the faithful to venerate one last time for the year, before it is put away.

This is a holy day of obligation. If you cannot attend services here, you should try to participate in Mass in a Roman rite parish, even though it will not be the Mass of the Ascension (the archdiocese of Santa Fe has moved it to Sunday).

After forty days of different appearances and teaching, Jesus summons the apostles to a final meeting with him. The most detailed rendering is in St. Luke's Acts of the Apostles. In all of the accounts, Our Lord takes the Eleven Apostles out to Mount Olivet, where He gives His last teaching: that they are to wait in Jerusalem until the Holy Spirit comes to them, the "power from on high"; that He will be us always, until the end of time; and that they are to proclaim the gospel around the world. Then He ascends into heaven. In Luke, two angels, who represent Moses and Elijah, tell the apostles to go back and wait for the Holy Spirit, just as the two angels had announced the resurrection to the myrrh-bearing women.

The Icons of the Ascension always show Our Lady in the center: she is there as His Mother but also as the first witness of the Good News of our salvation. She will be there again in both Pentecost icons and the account of Pentecost in Acts. In most of the icons, the apostles are shown in movement, but Mary is always shown standing still, her arms lifted up in the Orans position, in silent prayer.

All of them together represent the united Church, active and contemplative. Jesus is generally shown in a mandorla* of glory, His robes bright, and His hands raised up in blessing. Often angels are shown in the act of lifting Him up in a cloud toward heaven. It is worth noting that when the Jews spoke about divine glory, they would often say a radiant cloud, which was the Divine Presence, the Shekhina of YHWH. The mandorla is this Shekhina of God confirming Jesus' divinity.
