Saint Elijah the Prophet

We commemorate the glorious prophet Elijah on July 20. On this day, we remember the prophet whose words closed the heavens and initiated a drought to punish sinful Israel, and who later prayed for the heavens to open after Israel returned to the Lord. A small cloud rose up out of the Mediterranean, and that small cloud unleashed torrents of rain on the thirsty land. The little cloud is seen by the Fathers as foreshadowing the humble Virgin Mary, whose Son saved the human race.

Elijah's story is related in the Bible in 1 Kings, chapters 17-21, and again at the beginning of 2 Kings. He is the last of the great prophets in Israel, and because of his ascension into heaven as a living man, the Jews awaited his return to announce the Messiah (Malachi 3:19). Elijah appears in Jewish midrash and in the Talmud with many stories of him intervening in the world. An empty place is set for him at the Passover table so that he can come and announce the coming of the Messiah. In the Churches of the Byzantine tradition, this ancient Jewish practice has resulted in the practice of an empty place being set for Elijah at the Holy Supper on Christmas Eve, so that he can announce the birth of Christ.

Elijah is the spiritual father of the Carmelite Order; European ascetics lived on Mount Carmel during the Crusade era and wore a white habit slashed by black

marks which were seen as the wheel-marks from his chariot. Tradition claims that Carmel was home to a school of prophets who would come from the wilderness to chastise and warn Israel. The caves however had been long abandoned before the Catholic men settled here for lives of prayer and silence, in imitation of Elijah who went away from the world. Saint Albert of Jerusalem gave these men, the hermits of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, their first Rule in 1209-1214. In 1238, the Carmelite friars were driven out by the Muslim re-conquest of the Holy Land, and they took their Elijah and Marian traditions with them to Europe. The Carmelites are known especially for the devotion of the wearing of the Brown Scapular, a small version of their habit, which depicts the image of Carmel on end and that of Our Lady of Mount Carmel and the Christ Child handing the scapular to Saint Simon Stock.

In the Evangelization of pagan Europe, St. Elias the Prophet pushed aside both Greek and Slavic gods. The Byzantine emperors Zeno (5th century) and Basil I (9th century) both promoted devotion to the prophet of Mt. Carmel, emphasizing his role regarding the weather. As a result, Elijah came to be invoked for rain during droughts, and for protection against thunder and lightning during storms.

Car Blessings:

Because Elijah was taken up into heaven in a chariot, he became the patron of wheeled vehicles. Wagons and carts – so important in the agricultural society of Eastern Europe– were blessed on his feast day. From there, it was an easy transition to bless cars, trucks, motorcycles, and bicycles. The prayer of blessing vehicles asks for heavenly blessings on vehicles and people, guardian angels to protect all, and that we use our cars etc. in the proper spirit.

Sunday of the Fathers of the Six Ecumenical Councils: On the Sunday between the 13th and the 19th of July, the Eastern Churches commemorate the first Six Ecumenical Councils. These began in 325 AD, just 14 years after the Christian Faith was given legal status in the Roman Empire, as the Church sought to define Who Jesus Christ is, and how we are saved by His Precious Blood on the Cross and brought to new life in Him.

The First Ecumenical Council in Nicaea, 325 A.D.: refuted the heresy of Arius against Jesus being the Son of God, and codified the Nicene Creed with an expanded section on Jesus' role in salvation history;

The Second Ecumenical Council in Constantinople, 381 A.D. condemned the heresy of Macedonius against God, the Holy Spirit, emphasizing that the Third Person of the Trinity is equal to and co-eternal with the Father and the Son, and modified the Nicene Creed for the last time with additions explaining the role of the Spirit;

The Third Ecumenical Council in Ephesus, 431 A.D. refuted the heresy of Nestorius against the Mother of God, and Mary was acclaimed as Theotokos, the God-bearer, emphasizing that Jesus is divine as well as human from the moment of conception in her womb;

The Fourth Ecumenical Council in Chalcedon, 451 A.D. rejected the Monophysite heresy, and gave us the crucial explanation of Jesus as One Person with human and divine natures:

The Fifth Ecumenical Council in Constantinople, 553 A.D. tried to reconcile the Nestorian and Monophysite Churches of the Middle East with the Great Church (now the Catholic and Orthodox Churches) but failed. It defines Jesus again as One Person, and the hymn "O Only Begotten Son" or the Monogenes, was introduced into the Byzantine Liturgy in order to further define this for the faithful, and excesses of Origen's thought condemned;

The Sixth Ecumenical Council in Constantinople, 691 A.D. condemned the Monothelite heresy, which said that Jesus had only one will - that would have reduced His humanity's freedom.

These Councils, held over the span of 370 years, hammered out the definitions of Jesus that we take for granted today when we sing the Monogenes and Creed in Divine Liturgy: the Eternal Word, Who became incarnate in the womb of the Virgin Mary through the Holy Spirit and not man, Who was fully human and fully divine in One Person, with free human will and free divine will, Who willingly and out of love not only preached and healed on earth, but suffered the saving Passion and Death so as to restore us to our destiny as children of God, and rose from the dead and ascended into heaven, from which He will return to judge us all at the end of time and the resurrection of the dead.

Saint of the Week

July 17 - Bl. Paul Peter Gojdič was the heroic bishop of Prešov in its most difficult times (1926-1960). Born on July 17, 1888 to a married priest, he was by nature a quiet and gentle man who loved to be alone with God. But he was pulled out of his monastery to become bishop. He stated then: "I will become a father of orphans, helper of the poor and consoler of the afflicted."

When our Church faced a state-supported campaign to convert our faithful to Orthodoxy, he worked hard to stop this. He led the people through the Depression known as a man of charity who would always help. In 1938, Czechoslovakia was destroyed and Slovakia became a state dependent upon Hitler. He was the only bishop in Slovakia to consistently protest against deporting Jews to their deaths; he also defended the Rusyn minority against Slovak nationalists; directed missionary work in the Czech lands to serve faithful who moved there; cared for orphans and pushed religious education for all. Israel recognized him as a Righteous Gentile for saving the lives of at least 30 Jews himself, and instructing his priests to baptize any Jew who came to them - and so save them from deportation to Auschwitz. Slovakia would protect a baptized Jew and their family. Over 2,000 Jews were saved this way from being sent to Auschwitz.

In 1950, the Communists took over Czechoslovakia. Immediately they attacked our Church, on orders from Moscow, to force us into the Russian Orthodox Church, which cooperated with Stalin. Bishop Gojdič and his auxiliary Blessed Basil Hopko were arrested at the doors of the cathedral and he was put into prison on his birthday. In prison, he had the gift of bilocation, appearing when other victims needed his spiritual help while still being in his cell, and had the wounds of Jesus in his hands. He was treated very harshly and suffered greatly, but never complained or condemned the communists.

He could have escaped prison and been installed as Orthodox Patriarch of Czechoslovakia, if he would break with Rome, and he refused to do so. He asked God for the grace to die on his birthday, July 17, and for Sacraments from a priest. On the night of July 16, another priest-prisoner was put into the bed next to his, and he heard the bishop's confession. Bishop Gojdič died the next morning, in 1950.
