

July 23: Bl. Basil Hopko

Father Basil Hopko was consecrated as auxiliary bishop of Prešov on May 11, 1947, by Bl. Pavel Gojdich, due to increasing Communist pressure on the Greek Catholic Church of Czechoslovakia. Together they secretly consecrated several other bishops, anticipating that they themselves would soon be arrested by the communists. The following year the country was taken over by the communists, and persecution began immediately of both Roman and Greek Catholics, as well as known anti-communists. In 1950 our Church was suppressed and ordered to join the Russian Orthodox Church. Both bishops, all of the monks and nuns, and most of the parish priests – and all of the secret bishops - refused to do so and were jailed. Hopko was tortured repeatedly, for weeks at a time, in order to force him to sign for Orthodoxy. He never yielded, although he went through severe depression repeatedly as a result of his isolation and tortures. Finally, he was released in 1960 and sent to a monastery that served as a concentration camp for Catholic nuns.

In 1968 our Church was partially restored during the famous Prague Spring. The Spring came to an end in August due to an invasion by the USSR and Warsaw Pact nations. Hopko should have become the bishop, but Slovak nationalists interfered, denouncing him because he was an ethnic Rusyn. Hopko was restricted to parish visits and ordaining some priests. He died on July 23, 1976, from the effects of arsenic poisoning that was begun when he was in jail and continued by traitors outside the prisons. His levels were 100,000 times the safest amount someone could have in their system. He was beatified as a martyr by Saint John Paul II in 2003.

July 24: SS. Boris and Gleb, Passion-bearers

Boris (in baptism David) and Gleb (in baptism Roman) were brothers by the same mother. Their father Vladimir, before his baptism, had numerous wives and many children by them. Following ancient custom, Vladimir divided up the state of Kiev-Rus' among all of his sons before his death. This weakened the kingdom, and opened the door to civil war. The eldest son, Sviatopolk, became Prince of Kiev, wanted more power, and he planned to kill his brothers in order to gain their territories, in 1015.

Some of Vladimir's former advisers told Boris that he should take the army and establish himself as ruler of Kiev. Saint Boris, however, said that he could never lift his hand against his own brother. Sviatopolk sent assassins to kill Boris, who already knew that his brother wanted him dead. When they arrived, they heard him praying before an icon of Christ. He asked the Lord to strengthen him for the suffering he was about to endure. He also prayed for Sviatopolk, asking God not to count this against him as sin. Then he lay down upon his couch, and the assassins stabbed him with their lances.

After Sviatopolk had killed Boris, he sent Gleb a message but Gleb received word that their father had died and that Sviatopolk had murdered Boris. St. Gleb wept for his father and brother, and was lamenting when the assassins arrived. They seized his boat and drew their weapons, and Gleb's own cook stabbed him with a knife. The martyr's body was thrown onto the shore between two trees. Later, he was buried beside St Boris in the church of St Basil.

Boris and Gleb became immediately popular among the ordinary people, since they died rather than subject the nation to civil war, and were acclaimed as being "Passion bearers", that is, suffering as Jesus Christ did, silently and out of a desire to save others. In addition, there were many miracles of healing at their tomb. As for their murderous brother, he became known as Sviatopolk the Cursed. He was overthrown, and defeated in two wars. Yaroslav the Wise became Grand Prince, and ruled the country in peace; his children married into royal families in England, France, Hungary, and Norway which shows just how interconnected medieval Ukraine was with western Europe.

Saint Anne, mother of the Virgin Mary. July 25 is the feast of the Dormition of Saint Anne. We commemorate her holy death on this day.

The mother of the Virgin Mary is given the name Ann in Christian writings; her father is named as St. Joachim. St. Anne is the patron of mothers and grandmothers, of women with infertility or pregnant mothers, among many other titles. The legend is that Joachim and Ann were childless, conceiving Mary in their old age as a singular gift from God. Icons depict Anne with the young Mary, or sometimes also with the Infant Jesus.

First class relic in church:

The Shrine of Saint Anne de Beaupre, in Canada, has two major relics, one from the wrist of Saint Anne, with skin and flesh still visible and fresh at the junction of wrist and thumb, and a part of the forearm, given by the basilica of St Paul Outside the Walls in Rome. Our parish has a tiny first-class relic of Saint Ann from that large relic. The anointing is done with the holy oil blessed in Canada.

July 27: St Panteleimon (by Fr Chris)

St Panteleimon (also called Pantaleon) is an enormously popular saint. In the West he is counted among the <u>Fourteen Holy Helpers</u>. In the East he is one of the <u>Holy Unmercenary Healers</u>, (physicians who did not charge for their services and were known for miraculous cures during their lives on earth). He was a <u>martyr</u> of <u>Nicomedia</u> in <u>Bithynia</u> during the <u>Diocletian persecution</u> of 303 AD. Women named Pamela are named for him.

St. Alphonsus Liguori wrote of the saint's conversion to Christianity: He studied medicine with such success, that the Emperor Maximillian appointed him his physician. One day as our saint was discoursing with a holy priest named Hermolaus, the latter, after praising the study of medicine, concluded thus: "But, my friend, of what use are all thy acquirements in this art, since thou art ignorant of the science of salvation?

The legend of Panteleimon's martyrdom is filled with heroic suffering. But he was a real martyr, as veneration of him in the local church is very old, and a shrine was built in his honor by the emperor Justinian as a result. His name means "mercy for everyone" or "all-compassionate." He is said to have been beheaded under an olive tree, an appropriate spot given the medicinal uses of olive oil in the ancient world. Vials of his blood are kept at Ravello in Italy, and in Madrid, Spain. The blood in each vial liquefies on his feast. This has failed in Madrid only twice: in 1914, right before World War I, and 1936, before the outbreak of the Spanish Civil War. With that track record, even non-churchgoing Spaniards check to see if the miracle occurs or not.

There is an icon of St. Panteleimon near the 7-day candle stand where you can light candles for his intercession for those sick in soul or body. He is always shown holding an open medical kit, with a spoon ready to dispense medicine.
