Christ is Risen! / Indeed He is Risen

May 9 is the feast of the two patron saints of travelers: Translation of the Relics of St Nicholas of Myra and St Christopher. After Myra was taken by the Turks, there was a very real danger that the church of Saint Nicholas would be turned into a mosque and his relics vandalized. Myra and Bari had a long history of mutual trade and devotion to Saint Nicholas, patron of sailors. In 1087 merchants from Bari removed the sacred relics and carried the body of the saint to Italy. There he reposes in a magnificent shrine built by the Greek and Latin Christians of the city, and there the relics still give off "myrrh", a clear liquid that is used to anoint the sick. Cures still take place at the tomb. In Myra, meanwhile, the Christians were indeed expelled and services forbidden in the original shrine, which is now a ruin.

St. Christopher - this popular saint has been acclaimed as the protector of travelers since ancient times. All we know for certain is that he was a soldier killed in Antioch circa 250 AD. He was a tall and strong man, a Canaanite who converted to Christianity. His legend says that while seeking to serve the greatest king on earth, a little boy asked the future saint to carry him on his shoulders across a river. As the saint did so, the little boy's weight got heavier and heavier, and the exhausted ferryman was happy to deposit his little charge on the opposite bank. At this, the boy revealed Himself to be Jesus Christ, the King of the Universe, Who carried the sins of the world. Christ told him that now he would be named

Christ-carrier, or Christopher. The divine Child told Christopher to thrust his traveler's staff into the ground, and it bloomed into a big tree, which is why his staff is always shown with green leaves on it. He is also shown with a cross, as a sign that he died as a martyr for the Christ whom he carried that day. The practice of painting St. Christopher and Jesus by the house or church door, or on the last house on the road leading out of a town are based on the saying that if you saw St. Christopher, all would be well. This was later translated into the practice of wearing or displaying medals of the saint as patron of travelers. While the Roman Church did drop his feast day along with many other ancient saints of whom little was known back in the 1960s, he remains a saint in good standing. Every baptized Christian should be a Christ-carrier, as people who reveal Jesus to the world.



Sunday of the Samaritan Woman

On this Sunday, our Church remembers the meeting of Jesus Christ with the Samaritan Woman. Jesus has stopped to rest from a long journey, and the woman comes to the well at noon, the hottest time of the day. In the first century, Jewish men weren't supposed to speak to Samaritan women, and certainly not without their husbands present. Yet hers is the longest conversation that Jesus has with any one individual — male or female — in the entire Bible. Our tradition has named her $\Phi\omega\tau\epsilon\nu\dot{\eta}$ (Fotini), meaning the illuminated one. Jesus encountered Fotini at a well, where she was about to draw water. In their conversation, Jesus says that he could give her living water, to which she said, "give me this water that I may not thirst, nor come here to draw again."

Jesus and Fotini are using the same words to describe two different realities. To Fotini, living water meant running water, as from a stream or a river. Water in a container was not considered to be living water. She did not want to go to the well. To Jesus however, living water meant something far greater. As Church Fathers have pointed out, the living water that Christ offers is water that is filled with the grace of the Holy Spirit. For us, our first encounter with living water is in the water of baptism, which is blessed by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, through which we become illumined and given new life. The well where we draw that living water is the Church. She is overwhelmed by his compassion and acceptance of her, an outsider. Without being told, he already knows her life story and the struggles and stigma that she endures. He does not judge her. She instantly recognizes him as a prophet, a man of God, and goes on to evangelize her entire town.

Perhaps the Samaritan woman's greatest burden is shame. She comes to the well at the very odd hour of noon precisely to avoid all the other women who were there at dawn. Her relationships are in disorder. By refusing to be put off, Jesus shows her how important she is for Him. And she doesn't know what to do with that. Her undeniable interest in Jesus reveals her awareness that something is missing or out of order in her life but her responses to Him all seek to turn Him away. In the end, she surrenders, sheds her shame, reaches out to her neighbors, and brings a whole town to Christ. After five husbands and a live=in boyfriend, it is Christ the Bridegroom who enables her to become the mother of a new Church.

Why do our spiritual lives seem so barren? In today's Gospel the Samaritan Woman's experience points to some clue for us. It is a sacramental encounter with Risen Christ. The Lord knows the Woman at the Well is a sinful woman, but He does not judge or condemn her. He gently, compassionately and masterfully leads her in confession, modeling for her the truth of who He is and who she may become. The Lord speaks and then graciously awaits her response. She asks to receive the living water and the Lord desires to grant her request, but first He helps to pave the way by revealing the things that stand in the way. She must first confess and repent of her sins. Purification is the first step in the spiritual life because virtue is the necessary foundation. If we attempt to embark on the spiritual life without this, we will be as the foolish man who built his house on the sand. At the first appearance of temptation the house crumbles because its foundation is weak. But the house built on the firm foundation of virtue stands firm. Not even a legion of demons could bring it down.

Jesus helps the Woman at the Well prune away the things in her life that distract her from an intimate relationship with God based on "spirit and truth." This is what the sacrament of Confession is all about; not just the listing of sins, but the uprooting of the causes of sin. As we progress in the spiritual life what we confess becomes more and more subtle, as we begin to work with the thoughts, emotions and conditioning that give rise to our sin. Denied the living water of God, we search for other sources of water we hope will quench our thirst, but they produce only more thirst.
