The symbolism of the "complete" Cross is quite complex. Through the Cross came our Salvation. We are constantly reminded that Christ died for us when we see the Image of the Cross (depicting the crucified Lord), and we are reminded that He rose from the dead when we behold the Image of Christ "Not made by hands" (Slavonic:

Hepyкотворений образь) on the towel (depicting the Lord risen from the dead). Worshipping the crucified Lord are two flying angels. In some depictions of the Cross the Angels are bearing an image of the Holy Trinity, but traditions vary in allowing this; usually the Angels are simply holding towels, indicating their position as messengers who serve the Lord and who wait on Him. The top bar of the Cross is the title-board which is the product of the Cross is the street of the Cross is the cross

Pilate ordered to be hung in mockery over Christ's head. On this board was inscribed: "Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews" in Hebrew, Greek and Latin (abbreviated to the Greek initials 'INBI', or the Latin initials 'INRI' in the Western tradition). This has been replaced with the Christian inscription: "King of Glory" (Slavonic: Царь славы), placed below the knees of the angels. In addition, just above Christ's arms we see the inscription: 'ICXC', being the first and last letters of Christ's name in Greek (Greek: lisous Khristos; Old Rite

Slavonic: looycs Христось; New Rite Slavonic: lucycs Христось). On the bottom we see the Mother of Jesus with St John the Beloved Disciple. Note that in the proper Orthodox tradition the Savior does not wear a crown of thorns (as in the Western tradition), nor is He portrayed alive on the Cross, nor in any aspect of suffering, but in a state of humble and peaceful repose, with inclined head. Also note that His feet are nailed with two nails.

3rd Sunday of the Great Fast – VENERATION OF THE HOLY CROSS

Each of the Sundays of Great Lent has its own special theme. This Sunday's theme is that in the cross of Christ crucified lies both "the power of God and the wisdom of God" for those being saved (1 Cor 1:24). On this Sunday in the middle of the Lenten season, the cross stands in the middle of the church, not merely to remind the faithful of Christ's redemption and for them to keep the goal of their Lenten efforts, but also as a reminder: "He who does not take up his cross and follow me is not worthy of me" (Mt 10:38). The historical theme, as seen in the hymnology, is the victory and joy of the cross, not the suffering. The Church fathers equate the life-giving cross with the tree of life and plant it in the middle of the Lenten pilgrimage. It was the tree that was planted in Paradise; it is to remind the faithful of both Adam's bliss and how he was deprived from it.

For the catechumens of the early church, and the faithful preparing for Pascha today, the spiritual theme starts to change from personal faith, and personal effort, to Christ. The Church teaches that it is Christ's cross that saves. One cannot take up his own cross and follow Christ unless one has Christ's cross which he took up to save mankind. Partaking of this tree, one will no longer die, but will be kept alive.

This Sunday is here to refresh, reassure and to encourage those participating in Great Lent. We are now at the halfway point of the Great Fast, and we are encouraged to either keep up the good work, or get moving on our conversion! The Church equates the appearance of the cross at this time to the banners and symbols that precede the return of a victorious king. The Epistle reading is from Hebrews 4:14-5:6 and explains Christ's priesthood, and the Gospel lesson from Mark 8:34-9:1 ends with And He said to them, "Assuredly, I say to you that there are some standing here who will not taste death till they see the kingdom of God present with power.

The cross is the door to mysteries. Through this door the intellect makes entrance in to the knowledge of heavenly mysteries. The knowledge of the cross is concealed in the sufferings of the cross. And the more our participation in its sufferings, the greater the perception we gain through the cross. For, as the Apostle says, `As the sufferings of Christ abound in us, so our consolation also abounds in Christ. - St Isaac of Syria

O Savior of all men, especially of those who have faith, Because Thou were crucified of Thy own will, and was put to death voluntarily, the lawless say not of their will were the limbs of the robbers broken; But Thine, they did not break, in order that they might learn That Thou didst not come among the dead against Thy will, but willingly Thou didst give up Thy spirit, Thou Who art everywhere and fills all things. – St Romanos

Of course, it would be easier to get to paradise with a full stomach, all snuggled up in a soft feather-bed, but what is required is to carry one's cross along the way, for the kingdom of God is not attained by enduring one or two troubles, but many! – Elder Anthony of Optina

The knowledge of the Cross is concealed in the sufferings of the Cross. - Pope Gregory the Great

We have been born anew through baptism and restored by the tree of the cross. The passion of the Lord effects the resurrection of our race and its readiness by grace to paradise whence it had fallen by sin freely willed. When Christ provided for us the refuge of his cross, the Lord destroyed the sting of death which was reigning over us. — St Benedict of Nursia

The cross is taken up by us, when either our body is pained by abstinence, or our soul afflicted by fellow-feeling for our neighbor. – St Bede the Venerable
