There are 135 children in Grades K-12 with 22 teachers; 15 children are refugees. One building is complete. Despite the war, they are going ahead with putting up a second building. Parents are covering most ordinary costs, despite a 24% inflation rate. **Our support will pay for the refugee children's tuition and help get the next building done.** The indomitable spirit of the Ukrainian citizenry is summed up in this lyric from a popular song: "They can bomb happiness, they can shoot the dream, but they can't kill the will." Every dollar will go so very far over there.

World Youth Day is the largest international Catholic youth (ages 18-35) gathering scheduled to take place Aug. 1–6. St. John Paul II established the weeklong youth gathering in 1985. Lisbon, the Portuguese capital set to host World Youth Day 2023, is just 75 miles from Fatima, one of the most visited Marian pilgrimage sites in the world. The theme of Lisbon's World Youth Day is "Mary arose and went with haste." In his message for the event, Pope Francis urged young people to "not postpone all the good that the Holy Spirit can accomplish in you." "Now is the time to arise! Like Mary, let us 'arise and go in haste.' Let us carry Jesus within our hearts and bring him to all those whom we meet."

Today is the Sunday of the Forefathers –Fr. Chris

All the great Fathers and Mothers and Prophets of the Old Testament, starting with Adam, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, are called to mind this weekend including such figures as the Holy Prophets Elias and Daniel. The Office of today concludes with the parents of the Forerunner of Christ, SS. Zechariah (Zachary) and his wife Elizabeth and the parents of the Virgin SS. Joachim and Ann. These are the faithful generations who lived before the Law and under the Law, especially the Patriarch Abraham, to whom God said, "In thy seed shall all of the nations of the earth be blessed" (Gen12:3, 22:18).

What connection is there between them and us? In general, the Church brings them to our attention now, right before Christmas, largely because of their faith – their belief in the promise given by God to Adam during his expulsion from the Garden of Eden that in the end a Savior will come into the world and will redeem mankind from original sin. All the forefathers of the Jewish people – who lived on earth long before the birth of Christ – lived and burned with this faith, never allowing it to be extinguished. They are a shining example to us, who are living on earth after the Incarnation of our Lord. Just like those ancient people we, too, have never actually seen Christ: they only knew that He would come into the world, while we know that He did come into the world. But they firmly believed in His coming and their faith was justified in Jesus!

Icons of this Sunday include: -the "Root" or Kursk icon, which depicts Our Lady of the Sign flanked by Kings David and Solomon and several prophets; - Daniel and the Three Youths in the furnace, who were protected from burning by an angel who prefigures Christ; - Our Lady and the Prophets of Israel.

FIFTH WEEK OF THE PHILIP'S FAST: SAINTS OF THE WEEK

December 13th is the feast day of St. Lucy. St. Lucy was a virgin martyr during the earliest centuries of Christianity under its worst persecution at the hands of the Roman Empire, therefore making her one of the most glorious saints in heaven. Lucia means "light," a fitting name for a young woman who was known to visibly glow and radiate in her love for her spouse, Jesus Christ. Falling during the long, dark winter, there are many beautiful traditions associating this saint with the meaning of her name, the story of her life, and her glorious position in heaven. Her feast day is celebrated with candles, torches, and even bonfires.

Legends say that St. Lucy would wear a wreath of candles on her head so she could see better, her arms full of supplies, as she served the poor Christians hiding from persecution in the dark underground catacombs. This is the source of the custom in Scandinavia where to this day young girls wear a crown of lit candles in the pre-dawn darkness and deliver a plate of baked sweets to their family.

This week we celebrate the feast of the Prophet Daniel, and the Three Holy Youths. The name Daniel is translated as "God is my Judge" and this book passes on God's judgment against the Gentile nations who persecuted Judaism. Daniel's writings are used in the divine offices of the Byzantine Rite, especially on Holy Saturday for the baptism of catechumens. During the Vespers, the story of the Three Holy Youths is read. These are three Jewish men who were among those deported from Jerusalem after it fell to the Babylonian army in 605 BC. They were enlisted as servants in the royal court. Ironically, their Jewish names are taken from them – Hananiah, Mishael, and Azariah – and they were named after Babylonian gods – Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego – in order to wean them away from their faith. But the True God of Israel will show His power in a dramatic way using these three.

They and Daniel were allowed to keep kosher diets, and rose in the ranks due to their diligence and hard work. But they are endangered when Nebuchadnezzar orders everyone to worship statues of him. They refused and the three youths were thrown into a fiery furnace as punishment. But an angel of the Lord descends and the raging fire becomes like cool dew to the Jews, while those standing nearby are burned alive by its heat. The Angel is traditionally interpreted as the Word of God, the Logos Who became Jesus Christ in the Incarnation, hence the placement of this feast near Christmas.

Daniel was known for his skill in the interpretation of dreams (Daniel 1:17 and 2:14) and of mysterious handwritings on the wall done by the Divine Hand itself. He is included among the prophets and was referred to by Christ as a prophet in Mark 13:14 and in Matthew 24:15. The time and circumstances of Daniel's death are not recorded. By tradition his age at death was near 100 years. A number of places have claimed to be his place of burial, including Susa in present day Iran, and Daniel's Tomb in Kirkuk, the Kurdish capital in Iraq.

Daniel also includes the prophet's interpretation of dreams sent by God to the king, the vision of the Ancient of Days (the source of portraying God the Father as an elderly man dressed in shining white), and the triumph of the worship of the True God, thanks to the intervention of Cyrus who defeated Babylon in 539 BC.
