World Youth Day is the largest international Catholic youth (ages 18-35) gathering scheduled to take place Aug. 1–6 "Dear young people, I invite you to register for this meeting in which, after a long period of staying at a distance, we will rediscover the joy of the fraternal embrace between peoples and between generations, which we need so much," Pope Francis said on Oct. 23. St. John Paul II established the weeklong youth gathering in 1985. At some past World Youth Days, attendance has reached into the millions.

Lisbon, the Portuguese capital set to host World Youth Day 2023, is just 75 miles from Fatima, one of the most visited Marian pilgrimage sites in the world. The theme of Lisbon's World Youth Day is "Mary arose and went with haste." In his message for the event, Pope Francis urged young people to "not postpone all the good that the Holy Spirit can accomplish in you." "Now is the time to arise! Like Mary, let us 'arise and go in haste.' Let us carry Jesus within our hearts and bring him to all those whom we meet."

Please, sign up TODAY for the Traveling Pilgrim Vocation Icon in 2023

Dear Parish Family, the Love of Christ presses us to respond generously to God's call in our lives. We are all called to pray for vocations to Saintly Christian Marriage, to the Priesthood, the Diaconate and the Religious Life. Prayer is an invisible but essential ministry in the Church. This is an important way to be involved in vocation ministry. Sign up to have the Pilgrim Vocation Icon in your home. You will be greatly blessed.

Ask a priest anything question: Did Judas betray Jesus out of hatred for him? Or did he just assume that Jesus would escape?

The only clues we have about Judas' reasoning is from the Scriptures: that he was the treasurer ("he held the common purse" John 13:29) but he was a thief (John 12:6). He is not the only person in history to have access to other people's money who then stole from them. The price was the reward given for the capture of a bandit, so the temple clergy got a bargain when they paid out the thirty pieces of silver for the Son of God. In one tradition, Judas' tragedy is that he has sorrow for his sin, but unlike Peter he does not try to be reconciled with Christ, but commits suicide. In the Lucan tradition, he does not repent at all, but plans to enjoy his ill-gotten gains by buying the potter's field, which would allow him to sell clay for the all-important industry of making pots. But he falls in that field and is killed, never getting to enjoy his planned prosperity. Either way, the betrayal is a disaster for Judas.

The Christmas Fast/ Saint Philip's Fast/ Filipovka begins on Nov. 15. This is the forty days of preparation for the Nativity of Our Lord on December 25. It continues through Christmas Eve, which is a day of strict fast and abstinence. It is named after Saint Philip, because it begins on his feast day. "Forty" has great significance in our religious history, from the forty years of Israel's wandering in the desert to be purified so as to enter into the Holy Land, to the forty days of Great Lent before Easter.

Unlike the restoration of Lenten fasting and services, this season has come up against the American tendency to celebrate Christmas for a long time before the actual feast of the Nativity, with office parties, school pageants, Christmas cakes and cookies, and the very odd habit of practically ignoring the Christmas season after December 26 except for taking down the tree and hitting the stores for holiday sales. Advent in the Latin Church is no longer marked by fasting or penance, with the purple vestments being almost the only remnant of Advent as a penitential season of preparation for Christ's nativity.

While American culture now emphasizes Christmas as a one-day event, this season is also filled with feast days of Old Testament prophets who spoke of the coming of the messiah to help us prepare well. After Christmas, we follow up with a series of holy days for the Mother of God, Saint Stephen, Circumcision/ New Year's, and then the Baptism of the Lord. Christmas should impel us to see how it all leads to the Theophany and Jesus' public ministry. With Theophany, the mystery of God is fully revealed to us. Centuries of waiting for the Messiah became true in Jesus Christ, the Son of God and son of Mary.

In America, the regulations of this Fast are not strict, as it falls during the winter. Abstinence remains in force for Friday, and is recommended for Wednesday and if possible, also Monday. Christmas Eve remains a day of strict fast: no meat, no dairy, one main meal, which is the Holy Supper in the evening.

Our Lady of the Sign - the icon of the Philip's Fast / Preparation for Christmas

This icon depicts the Theotokos during the Annunciation at the moment of saying, "May it be done to me according to your word." (Luke 1:38). The image of the Christ child represents him at the moment of his conception in the womb of the Virgin. He is depicted not as a fetus, but rather as a boy vested in divine robes, and often holding a scroll, showing that He is God the Word.

Christ can be shown in radiant white robes for His purity, or red and blue for His two natures of divinity and humanity in One Person. .

The term Virgin of the Sign or Our Lady of the Sign is a reference to the prophecy of Isaiah7:14: "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel". This icon usually dominates the sanctuary, so that the eyes are drawn from the iconostas, through the Royal Doors, to the tabernacle on the altar containing the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, to Christ incarnate in Mary's womb on the east wall. Containing the Creator of the Universe in her womb, Mary is the Platytera ton ouranon (Πλατυτέρα των Ουρανών): "More spacious than the heavens."

November 19: Holy Prophet Obadiah

Prophets begin to show up during the Advent/ Filipovka season as their writings make references to the coming of Christ. His short book is a prophecy against Edom, founded by Esau. It was a great persecutor of the Jews, but the feast is placed here because of the cry in it: "The kingdom is the Lord's!" Edom would be destroyed, as Obadiah said. Further, Obadiah emphasizes that Israel is dependent upon God, Who holds the destiny of nations in His hand. Thus, he prepared the people for the ultimate Kingdom of God, brought to us by Christ. How did he emerge as a prophet in the 9th century BC?

King Ahaziah sent three detachments of soldiers to arrest the holy Prophet Elias (July 20). One of these detachments was headed by Saint Obadiah. Through the prayer of St Elias, two of the detachments were consumed by heavenly fire, but St Obadiah and his detachment were spared by the Lord because he had sheltered the prophets from Jezebel's murderous rage in two caves (Kings 1). From that moment St Obadiah resigned from military service and became a follower of the Prophet Elias. Afterwards, he himself received the gift of prophecy. Obadiah was buried in Samaria. So, for us as we prepare for the Coming of Christ, who do we serve? No matter what our occupation, God must be our Master first!
